## Now Accepting Student Loan Applications for Students **Entering High School or University**

Student loans will be offered to students of the city. Those interested in a student loan, please receive an application from the General Education Department (located in the City Hall Main Office's East Wing on the 2nd floor) and apply. For more details, please use the QR code to the right to access the website.

**[Eligibility]** Those who fulfill all of the following requirements (for ② you only need to fulfil either a. or b.)

- ① Must exhibit upstanding behavior and outstanding academic performance
- 2 a. Those planning to go to high school, or currently in high school →Must have been a resident of the city for a year or more.
- b. Those planning to go to university, or currently in university
- →Must have graduated or passed the Certificate for Students Achieving the Proficiency Level of Upper Secondary School, in addition to having been a resident of the city for a year or more.
- ③ Current school GPA (Grade Point Average) is 3.5 or more (except those who have passed the Certificate for Students Achieving the Proficiency Level of Upper Secondary School)
- 4 Have difficulty receiving education due to finances
- (5) Have not accepted any other loan-type scholarships

**Applicant Limit** Few persons

[Application Documents] The General Education Department is distributing application forms from Tuesday, January 11th ~ Monday, January 31st (excluding weekends).

[Application Method] Please bring the completed application to the General Education Department between Tuesday, February 1<sup>st</sup> ~ Thursday, February 10<sup>th</sup> (excluding weekends).

[Selection Method] After screening the documents, a decision will be made. All applicants will receive notification of the results.

**Loan Interest** Interest-free

[Repayment Period] The stipend amount must be repaid within 10 years, beginning half a year following your graduation date. The admission funds must be repaid from October of the year of school entrance, to the formal end of school attendance.

[Additional Information] Application to other financial-aid is allowed but if chosen for this student loan, accepting other financial aid is not permitted.

### Protecting Senior Citizens' Piece of Mind by Granting QR **Codes**

QR codes are being issued that allow people, such as senior citizens, who may have gotten lost and unable to return home, or have been found and are being protected by police or other organizations, to be promptly identified and returned to their families.

#### The Process Until Returning Home

- ① The discoverer of the lost person reads the QR Code and contacts the 3<sup>rd</sup> party.
- ② The 3<sup>rd</sup> party contacts the registered emergency contact (e.g. family).
- \* Personal information such as identities or addresses will not be exposed.

# Maria-mochi

It seems to me that New Year's Day is the most celebrated day of the year in Japan. Certainly it is the most beautifully celebrated event, with decorations such as the pine-and-bamboo kadomatsu and rice-straw shimenawa placed near building entrances, and flocks of kimono-clad people lining up to make their hatsumode (first shrine visit of the New Year). In Western cultures, Christmas usually far outweighs the New Year in terms of importance, and often any decorations found around the New Year are actually those for Christmas, left out until the very end of the Christmas season. Growing up in America, I learned that if New Year's Day had any deeper significance than being the day to recover from New Year's Eve, it is as the Octave of Christmas, and for Roman Catholics, as the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. As Catholics are obliged to attend Mass on this day, the trip to attend Mass on January 1st has become a sort of hatsumode for me as a resident of Japan.

After attending this Mass one year, I found myself aimlessly wondering through a department store near Fukushima Station, waiting for the next train home. Being New Year's Day, the store's stock of kagami-mochi rice cakes had been marked down to half price. Their elaborate appearance caught my attention, and their steeply-discounted price gave me enough incentive to buy one, even if I was just going to eat the rice cake inside and throw out the layers of decorations it was packaged with. Yet as I held it on the train ride home, I couldn't help but try to think

of something better to do with the gaudy bits of paper and plastic paraphernalia, than merely use them to adorn the inside of my garbage bin. So once home, I took a miniature red paper fan out from the box, and attached it behind the head of a stature of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It resembled a halo, and the large decorative sheet of paper that I took out next had the image of a "treasure ship", which eerily resembled the square-rigged sailboats that missionaries such as St. Francis Xavier used to make the perilous voyage here, hundreds of years ago. That sheet of paper was to be placed under the round, plastic mochi container; and atop that case I placed the newly-decorated Marian statue. I was worried that the tall, heavy statue wouldn't be able to stay balanced atop the round mochi mound for long, but to my happy surprise it remained there for several days, until I finally took down my new New Year decorations.

As the New Year in Japan is a time for families to gather, enjoy traditional activities, and pray for good fortune, this holiday had always left me feeling alienated as a non-Japanese foreigner, living alone and without faith in mere luck. Yet by combining traditional Japanese New Year decorations with those that mark my own culture and faith, I have been able to find more meaning and happiness in New Year's Day. From now on, I intend on decorating a Maria-mochi every year on January 1st; as not only is it a way to celebrate this Catholic feast day, but it also takes advantage of clearance-priced mochi!
