

Camping

In Japan, schools begin their summer vacation in July; and one activity that families enjoy together during the summer is camping. During the coronavirus pandemic, camping has seemed to become more popular in Japan, but there are many elements of camping here that I find mystifying. For example, making a campfire at many Japanese campsites requires providing one's own portable fireplace, and then packing up and carrying home the ashes. Campgrounds here also offer sites for "daycamping", where campers can set up camp, make a campfire (with their portable fireplace), as well as prepare and eat campground cuisine - just to pack everything up and go home before night sets in.

Many English speakers might call such a practice "having a picnic", since "camping" is understood to involve staying somewhere overnight. This need not always be in a natural setting: there are many American campgrounds in the middle of towns or beside interstate expressways, convenient for families taking long road trips. As staying at one is much cheaper than staying at a hotel, and more enjoyable for children, my family often used them when I was young. Campgrounds would always have fire pits available (free of charge), and after roasting sausages and marshmallows, our only

responsibility was extinguishing the fire - no carrying home any ashes. Although playing around the campground with newly-made friends was enjoyable as a child, camping was far from a blissful experience. Campgrounds my family stayed at in the Rocky Mountains could be terribly cold on summer nights, and I distinctly remember being eaten alive by mosquitos while camping on the shore of Lake Tahoe. But the most harrowing experience was waking up one morning and looking out our tent trailer, directly at an adult black bear. Relief only came to my family when we realized that the bear was inside a cage; apparently it was the campground owner's pet.

If anything, undergoing such unforgettable experiences helped create stronger ties among my family, so our camping adventures proved worthwhile. If I have a family of my own in the future, I would like to find out together if staying overnight inside a tent pitched in the middle of a dark forest is as enjoyable as it is said to be. In the meantime, a solitary stay at

one of Japan's many secluded hot spring inns seems like a good way to spend a summer vacation!
