Tsukidate Academy

Coordinator for International Relations (hereafter, CIR) Tony spent one day a week (Lara, one day monthly) at Tsukidate Academy, a combined elementary and middle school which opened in April 2020. They participated in 1st through 3rd grade classes, played with the children during recess, and presented English-language lunchtime broadcasts.

• Activity Period : April 2022 \sim March 2023

• Cumulative Interactions with Children: 1310













English Experiences at Kindergartens, etc.

The CIRs visited kindergartens and certified childcare centers throughout the city and held English Experiences, in which the children were able to enjoy English through dancing and games, instead of through strict study.

- Activity Period: April 2022 \sim March 2023 (English Experiences were not held during August)
- **Number of Classes:** 84 occasions (once monthly at each kindergarten; two groups of children taught at Yanagawa Certified Childcare Center)
- Cumulative Count of Participating Children: 1,438





Outline of a Typical Lesson

Greetings & Dance	After greetings of "Hello!" and "Good Morning!", the CIRs and children sang and danced <i>Head, Shoulders, Knees, and Toes</i> .	
Simon Says	This game taught verbs such as "clap" and "stomp," with new verbs taught each month.	
Song	In June and July, the song <i>If You're Happy and You Know It</i> was sung; and from September to February, the English-language children's song <i>Bingo</i> was sung.	
Picture Book	From September, a picture book with simple English was read aloud to the children by the CIRs during each session.	
Game	Each month a new game was introduced and played using English (for example, Duck Duck Goose, London Bridge is Falling Down, English-language karuta, etc.).	
Presents	In order to instill fond memories, a new coloring sheet and word search was given to the children at the end of each session.	

English Activities at Family Park Date

English-language activities for children were held at Family Park Date, where the CIRs did things such as sing with the children and read pictures books to them.

- Activity Dates: April 26th, May 31st, August 30th, October 25th, December 20th, and February 21st
- Cumulative Count of Participants: 96





English Activities at Smile Park Hobara

At Smile Park Hobara, English-language activities where held, in which children and the CIRs interacted through playing Japanese and foreign games, etc., in accordance with the ages of the participating children.

- Activity Dates: May 19th, June 13th, July 14th, September 16th, October 20th, November 17th, December 15th, January 23rd, February 16th
- Cumulative Count of Participants: 56





English Activities at Afterschool Facilities

Enjoyable, hands-on English experiences were offered at Kakeda Kid's Club. Games using simple English were played, and true-false quizzes were used to introduce foreign cultures.

Activity Dates: April 25th, December 2nd

Hobara Elementary School's Challenge Classrooms

Hobara Elementary School's School Community Center Club hosts afterschool "Challenge Classrooms", in which school students can play in English. The alphabet and English phonics were taught through various games, helping the children learn to differentiate Roman characters and the sounds of spoken English, and providing an enjoyable English learning experience.

- Activity Dates: May 24th, June 17th, October 17th, November 14th, January 20th, February 13th
- Cumulative Count of Participants: 64





Easter Egg Hunt

To facilitate both the interaction with English and another culture, an Easter Egg Hunt, which is often seen during the Easter season in places such as North America and Europe, was held. Once the children found one of the many eggs hidden throughout various areas of Hobara Total Park, they brought it to one of the CIRs. After speaking simple English, they were able to exchange the egg for a treat.

Activity Date: May 29th

• Cumulative Count of Participants: 100 people (63 children, 37 guardians)





Handmade Halloween

A Halloween event was held to give young children an opportunity to experience American Halloween culture and simple English in a fun way. Using handmade Halloween decorations, the CIRs performed a play while teaching the participants Halloween-related vocabulary. After the performance ended, the children had an opportunity to choose their favorite design and try making their own decoration together with the CIRs.

Activity Date: October 16th

Cumulative Count of Participants: 20 people (10 children, 10 guardians)





Trivia Night

A quiz game called "Trivia Night" was held in both Japanese and English, aiming to promote exchange between Japanese and non-Japanese participants. Randomly assembled teams of Japanese and non-Japanese participants worked together to answer a variety of questions spanning several different topics. The team that earned the most points by the end was crowned winner and received prizes.

• Activity Dates: August 29th, November 18th, February 24th (Hobara) Cumulative Count of Participants: 72 people









Offsite English Courses

Lara taught English conversation in each of the five areas of the city, so that residents of every area could participate in English conversation courses.

- Activity Dates: Odd-numbered months (May, July, September, November, January, March)
- Cumulative Count of Participants: 112









Japanese Language Course

A Japanese language course was held to support foreign residents of the city. During the course, students were taught various grammar, vocabulary, and cultural through Japanese conversation, focusing on various themes such as shopping and Japanese holidays.

- Activity Dates: April 27th, June 21st, August 23rd, October 18th, December 6th, February 21st
- Cumulative Count of Participants: 14
